RELEVANCE

THE ENDURING LEGACY OF COLONIALISM PORTRAYED IN ACHEBE'S NOVEL CONTINUES TO RESONATE IN CONTEMPORARY DISCUSSIONS ABOUT POSTCOLONIAL IDENTITY AND NATION-BUILDING. *THINGS FALL APART* REMAINS A SEMINAL TEXT FOR UNDERSTANDING HOW COLONIAL HISTORIES SHAPE PRESENT-DAY AFRICAN SOCIETIES AND GLOBAL PERCEPTIONS.
